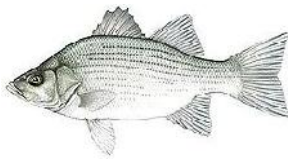


In 1937, the Redbud was chosen the state tree. It is a small to medium sized tree with reddish-pink blossoms.

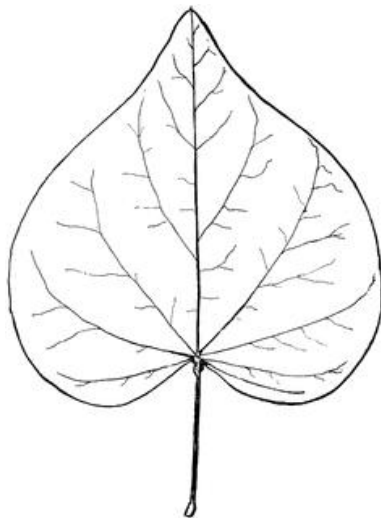

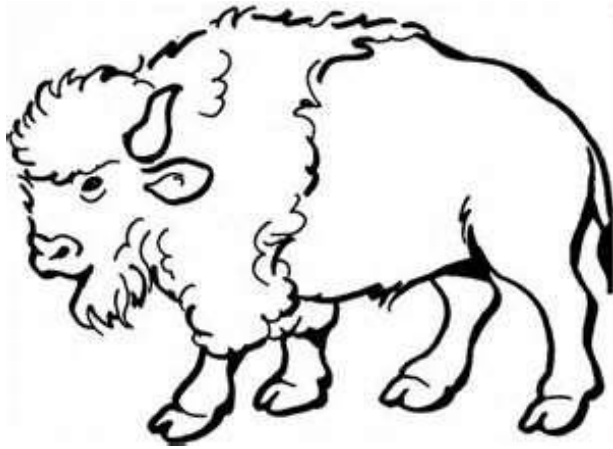

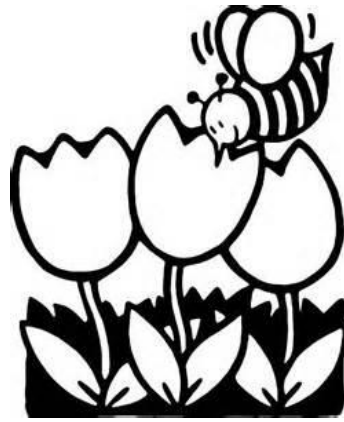
Oklahoma State Tree: Redbud
