It has bright yellow feathers and black head and wings.</p> 	<h3>State Flower</h3> <p>In 1972, the Violet was designated the state flower. It can be found in New Jersey fields, lawns, and meadows.</p> 	<h3>State Tree</h3> <p>In 1950, the Red Oak was chosen the state tree. It is native to North America with leaves that turn red in the fall.</p> 
<h3>State Fish</h3> <p>In 1992, the Brook Trout was chosen as the state fish. It is native to New Jersey.</p> 	<h3>State Animal</h3> <p>In 1977, the Horse was designated the state animal. A horse is included on the state seal. New Jersey has a lot of horse farms and many breed racehorses.</p> 	<h3>State Bug</h3> <p>In 1974, the Honeybee was designated the state bug.
